## ADOPTION OF LOCAL RULES OF PROCEDURE USER GUIDE

As of August 1, 2016, local rulemaking procedure has been consolidated into Pennsylvania Rule of Judicial Administration 103. Please click on these links to access the <u>order</u>, <u>rule text</u>, and <u>final report</u> adopting Pa.R.J.A. No. 103. This user guide focuses on the promulgation of local rules of procedure. <u>BEFORE ADOPTION</u>: A proposed local rule of procedure must be reviewed by a Rules Committee to ensure that the local rule is consistent with statewide procedure. A proposed local rule may be submitted via e-mail to <u>rulescommittees@pacourts.us</u> for review. Upon approval, no further copies of a local rule are required to be filed with the Rules Committees.

<u>AFTER ADOPTION</u>: Upon receiving written notification from a Rules Committee that the proposed local rule is not inconsistent with a statewide rule, a court may proceed with adoption and publication. There are four requirements that a court must fulfill following adoption. They are:

1. Copies of all local rules of procedure should be distributed according to the following schedule (please note that these copies no longer are required to be certified):

A. One copy to the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts via email to <u>adminrules@pacourts.us</u>.

B. Two paper copies and one electronic copy in a Microsoft Word format only on a CD-ROM to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to the following address:

Local rules may be e-mailed in a Microsoft Word format only to <u>bulletin@palrb.us</u> if the court is unable to provide a CD-ROM. PDF files will not be accepted for publication. The Microsoft Word format does not need to include the president judge's signature.

2. Publication of the local rule on the adopting court's website.

3. Incorporation of the local rule into the set of local rules on the adopting court's website within 30 days after the publication of the local rule in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

4. Filing one copy of the local rule in the appropriate filing office for public inspection and copying.

<u>EFFECTIVE DATES</u>: All local rules will become effective not later than 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
