

Pennsylvania's Treatment Courts – a Different Path for Justice

What are treatment courts?

Treatment courts – including veterans courts, adult and juvenile drug courts, DUI courts and mental health courts – divert nonviolent offenders from jail if they comply with treatment and program requirements. Participants are monitored by a team of judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, probation and treatment staff and mentors.



Goal of treatment courts:

To supervise treatment and rehabilitation of screened and selected defendants to try and change their behavior.

In 2023...

1,922 participants were admitted to treatment courts in Pennsylvania.

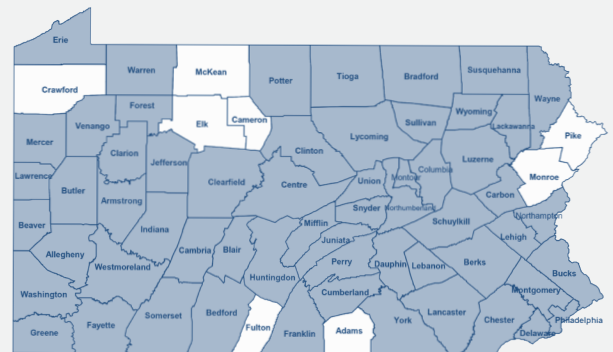
170 participants achieved an increase in education.

1,200 participants graduated successfully.

329 participants who were unemployed found jobs.

137 The current number of treatment courts in Pennsylvania

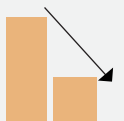


- has at least one treatment court
