This letter with attachments is submitted pursuant to the request by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court for the Carbon County Court of Common Pleas to examine the boundaries of District Courts 56-3-01, 56-3-02, 56-3-03, and 56-3-04 after the completion of the 2020 United States Census.

Plan Memorandum

Re: Magisterial District Reestablishment 2022 Carbon County 56th Judicial District

Date: January 18, 2022

As part of the decennial magisterial district reestablishment process for 2022, the 56th Judicial District (i.e., Carbon County) has prepared and evaluated a Judicial District Summary Worksheet for the County and a Magisterial District Summary Worksheet for each of the four magisterial districts within the County. Copies of these worksheets are attached to this Memorandum.

Carbon County is a sixth class county with a population, according to the most recent federal decennial census, of 64,749, which has remained relatively constant since the previous decennial count. The average total caseload for the County, as stated on the attached Judicial District Summary Worksheet, is 5,497. The average total caseload range for counties of the sixth class is 2,133 at the low end and 5,497 at the high end, with an average total caseload of 3,230. At 5,497, Carbon County has the highest caseload of all sixth class counties within the State.

Expounding upon the District's caseload, which is a numerical count of case filings, the County's average annual workload per magisterial district court – a "weighted caseload" computed by assigning a weight based on the average amount of judge time required to process each type of case – is 38,398. This also places Carbon County first among the twenty-four (24) counties in the sixth class which has a workload range varying from 15,937 to 38,398. The average annual workload for magisterial district courts in sixth class counties is 23,838.

The caseload and workload studies for the District support and justify the need for four magisterial district courts within the 56^{th} Judicial District and, to some

extent, lend support for the creation of a fifth magisterial district court as the case filings in the District increase.

The four magisterial district courts which currently exist in Carbon County are Magisterial District No. 56-3-01 (Jim Thorpe), Magisterial District No. 56-3-02 (Palmerton), Magisterial District No. 56-3-03 (Lansford), and Magisterial District No. 56-3-04 (Weatherly). In the magisterial district reestablishment for 2012, a realignment for Magisterial Districts 56-3-01, 56-3-02, and 56-3-03 took place, with reestablishment of Magisterial District 56-3-04. This realignment occurred in order to equitably distribute the workload among the magisterial district judges within the County.

depicted the Magisterial District As on Summarv Worksheets for each of the four magisterial districts within Carbon County, the workload within each of these districts is within 7.3% of the Judicial District's average total workload. When rounded to the nearest whole percentage, no magisterial district has a total workload which is 15% higher or lower than the workload of any other district. While the workload for District 56-3-04 is the lowest among Carbon County's magisterial districts, this workload has continued to increase since the last magisterial district reestablishment in large part due to the increased number of traffic citations resulting from trucking enforcement units set up by the Pennsylvania State Police on Interstate 80. It is also important to keep in mind that the geography and topography of Carbon County, combined with the existing roadways, cause the district court in this district to be more difficult to access from other areas in the County and would cause greater inconvenience to the public if cases from other municipalities or parts of municipalities were assigned to this district to shift workload from the other district courts in the County. See attached mapping of the four magisterial districts within the County. Even so, the average workload for District 56-3-04 at 35,674 is far in excess of the overall average workload in counties of the sixth class.

After consideration of all the data assembled and the summary of this data appearing on the attached worksheets for the County and for each magisterial district court within the County, as well as comparison with the case and work loads of other counties of the sixth class, the proposal being submitted to the Supreme Court for the 2022 magisterial district reestablishment is that the number of magisterial district courts within the 56^{th} District and the boundaries of these district courts remain the same, that is that each magisterial district court be reestablished.

19. Additional Remarks

Carbon County submitted information in the 2012 process that highlighted its unique role as the #1 6th Class County. Carbon's overall criminal caseload has increased dramatically since then. Additionally, District Court 56-3-04 has experienced rapidly increasing Traffic caseloads since 2015 due to PSP truck traffic enforcement on I-80 in Kidder Township.

Carbon County's Average Caseload exceeds the averages for Class 2, 2A, 3, 4, and 5 counties. District Court 56-3-04 has the highest Traffic caseload of all Class 2-8 counties.



When excluding 2014 & 2015 data and adding 2020 & 2021 data there is a yielded average of an annual increase of 545 traffic violations/year versus the period of 2014-2019 provided in the redistricting data sets. These traffic filings are more time-consuming for the judge than indicated by traffic case weights.

CARBON COUNTY MAGISTERIAL DISTRICT COURT REESTABLISHMENT

The Carbon County Court of Common Pleas hereby notifies the public that it has completed its review of the boundaries for Magisterial District Courts 56-3-01 (Jim Thorpe), 56-3-02 (Palmerton), 56-3-03 (Lansford), and 56-3-04 (Weatherly) based upon the following factors: Final results of the 2021 U.S. Census, caseload and workload data provided by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, and consultation with the respective Magisterial District Judges.

Pennsylvania statute requires the Court to review the boundaries of the Magisterial District Courts every ten (10) years after the U.S. Census is completed. At this time, President Judge Roger N. Nanovic is recommending to the PA Supreme Court that the boundaries of the four (4) District Courts in Carbon County should be reestablished in their current configuration for the next ten-year period of 2023-2032. Following is a list of the respective townships and boroughs within each District Court's jurisdiction.

56-3-01 (Jim Thorpe): Carbon County, Jim Thorpe Borough, Lehighton Borough, Mahoning Township (Packer-Jamestown), Penn Forest Township, Weissport Borough.

56-3-02 (Palmerton): Bowmanstown Borough, Carbon County, Franklin Township, Lower Towamensing Township, Palmerton Borough, Parryville Borough, Towamensing Township.

56-3-03 (Lansford): Carbon County, East Penn Township, Lansford Borough, Mahoning Township (Mahoning, New Mahoning), Nesquehoning Borough, Summit Hill Borough.

District justice districts remain unchanged

As per law, the Carbon County court completed a review of the boundaries for Magisterial District Courts in Jim Thorpe, Palmerton, Lansford and Weatherly.

The review was based on the final results of the 2021 U.S. Census, caseload and workload, data provided by the state Supreme County and consultation with the respective district judges.

As a result there are no changes to coverage areas for the judges from the previous year.

Following are the district justices' coverage areas:

• 56-3-01 (Jim Thorpe): Jim Thorpe, Lehighton, Mahoning Township (Packer-Jamestown), Penn Forest Township and Weissport.

• 56-3-02 (Palmerton): Bowmanstown, Franklin Township, Lower Towamensing Township, Palmerton, Parryville and Towamensing Township.

• 56-3-03 (Lansford): East Penn Township, Lansford, Mahoning Township (Mahoning, New Mahoning), Nesquehoning and Summit Hill Borough.

• 56-3-04 (Weatherly): Banks Township, Beaver Meadows, East Side Borough, Kidder Township, Lausanne Township, Lehigh Township, Packer Township and Weatherly.

Carbon district courts carry high caseloads

Carbon County's magisterial district courts have the highest workload among the state's other sixth-class counties, according to data the county compiled for the decennial re-establishment of the courts.

Carbon County's magisterial district courts have the highest workload among the state's other sixth-class counties, according to data the county compiled for the decennial reestablishment of the courts.

The Carbon Court of Common Pleas is taking public comment on the proposed plan to keep the county's four magisterial districts the same for the next 10 years, starting in 2023.

Carbon's caseload is the highest among the state's 24 sixth-class counties, despite the county's population remaining relatively constant at 64,749 since the last decennial count, courts said.

The average caseload for sixth-class counties is 3,230 with a count of 2,133 on the low end and 5,497 on the high end.

The workload for each district court, which is a "weighted caseload" computed by assigning a weight based on the average amount of judge time required to process each type of case, is 38,398, the courts said.

The average workload for magisterial district courts in sixth-class counties is 23,838 with the range between 15,937 and 38,398.

"This also places Carbon County first among the 24 counties in the sixth class," the courts said.

The caseload and workload justify the need for four district courts, and lend support for the creation of a fifth, as case filings increase, the courts said.

A realignment of Jim Thorpe, Palmerton and Lansford district courts took place in 2012 to distribute the workload, and the Weatherly district court remained the same.

The Weatherly district court, which is comprised of Banks Twp., Beaver Meadows, Carbon County, East Side borough, Kidder, Lausanne, Lehigh and Packer townships and Weatherly borough, has the lowest workload.

The workload has increased since the last re-establishment, mainly due to increased state police traffic enforcement of Interstate 80, the courts said.

The geography and topography of the county and existing roads would make this court harder to access for the public than other courts should workload be shifted, the courts said.

Still, the average workload of the Weatherly district court is in excess of the the overall average workload in sixth-class counties, the courts said.

With all factors considered, Carbon is submitting for the re-establishment of existing courts and boundaries in its proposed plan.
